

The Municipal Election is coming up on Nov.10. Champlain Park is hosting an ALL CANDIDATES MEETING on TUESDAY, OCTOBER 28 at 7:30 PM at the FIELD HOUSE.



Birds and Riverbank Ramble Sunday, October 19 at 1:30 P.M. Champlain Park Field House. The first Riverbank Ramble was a great success with about 50 people attending. So we are having another. This time the subject is birds with Tom Reeve, Vice-president of the Ottawa Field Naturalists. Tom will have a short slide show, longer if the weather is poor and we will attempt to find some birds in the neighbourhood and along the river. Come and join us and learn about our feathered friends.

Elections: Three more candidates have joined Shawn Little in running for City Councillor for our ward. They are Lynda Kitchikeesic-Juden, Michael Kostiuk and Andre Vertes.

Island Park Drive/Kirkwood Traffic Calming study: Today I learned that this study will likely not be coming before City or Regional Councils before the election. Since it was promised in June it is difficult to explain the delay. You should ask candidates for Chair, Mayor and our ward to explain this delay. Perhaps it is being held up by the NCC which will not decide on the operation of the Champlain Bridge before Nov. 20, and staff may wish to know that decision before finalizing their report.

New Zoning By-law: The latest version of 2020Z, the new zoning by-law, should be available shortly. The final disposition will occur in December. This week the FCA group, who have been working on some problem areas (funded by the city), presented some principles and some models showing how the new by-law might affect neighbourhoods in its original and revised versions and suggesting possible alternatives. These problem areas concern primarily planned unit developments, non-street oriented and apartments so should not affect our neighbourhood.

Hilson School: The future of Hilson School is now uncertain. The old school has been torn down but whether a new one will be built is a question that will be decided on Tuesday, Oct. 7 by the Local Educational Improvement Commission at 330 Gilmour Street. The space allocations for the new combined school board will not allow all schools promised to the former Carleton Board and the OBE. If it is not built the children may have to continue to attend Fisher Park. As you may be aware Elmdale is already using portables and with probable infilling in the area space would not be available at other elementary schools. If you are concerned attend the community meeting Oct. 6 at Fisher Park High School at 7:30 P.M.

Champlain Bridge: Thank you to several residents who sent money to help pay our legal bills. Fund raising continues; remember the House Tour Oct. 4 and keep in mind the Coffee House with Sneezy Waters and silent auction on Nov. 8. Also try to write the Commissioners before Nov. 20 asking that they restrict operation to two lanes.

We have two issues affecting this neighbourhood that have generated a lot of discussion and media attention. They are the mosque parking situation and the Champlain Bridge. Such "hot topics" can sometimes dominate a meeting and overshadow other equally important issues. In order to ensure that this doesn't happen at the meeting, I am proposing the following:

- 1. To have a community member give an overview of the major issues facing us at both the regional and city levels.
- 2. To set aside defined blocks of time for the potentially more contentious issues.

Given that we have two well-known politicians running against each other at the regional level, there is also the danger that this individual race could dominate the meeting. It would be unfair to the other candidates, and to community members who would like to hear from them, if we allowed this to happen. Therefore, the moderator (who will not be me) and time-keeper will do their utmost to ensure that all candidates have equal time. It is especially important that the regional race not over-shadow the city race, as we have candidates running at the city level that we don't know much about yet. We want the opportunity to hear from them. Having said the above, I think it is also an appropriate time to thank both Joan Wong and Linda Davis for their hard work on behalf of their constituents to date. This thanks will be delivered at the meeting.

In summary, our goal should be to have an orderly, respectful meeting that will allow those in attendance to gather the information they need to make an informed decision on election day. It would be much appreciated if all attendees could do their utmost to help achieve this goal.

Please bring some good questions to the meeting. Hope to see you there!
