We'll meet at the fieldhouse, **beginning at 10 a.m.,** and wrap up by noon. Juice, coffee and cookies will be served. In case of rain, the event will be moved to Sunday, April 30.

The designated cleanup areas are the south side of Premier above the transitway; the boulevard on Northwestern and the path at its north end; and along the fence on Patricia and Pontiac and in the NCC forest between the fence and the parkway. It can also include the area along the river at the foot of Carleton, or any other public spaces you think could use some help.

We recommend wearing pants and long-sleeved shirts, appropriate footwear and gloves. The city will provide garbage bags.

News on Patricia/Premier renaming, partial Pontiac closure

If you live on Patricia or Premier, you may be hearing from the City of Ottawa fairly soon about a possible street-renaming.

Ever since municipal amalgamation took place in 2001, the city has been going through a lengthy process to eliminate duplicate street names. (Imagine how many Church and Maple Streets there were between Ottawa, Nepean, Gloucester, Kanata, Rockcliffe, etc., etc.)

This is a particularly important step for emergency crews and first responders, who hardly need geographic confusion at a time of crisis.

(Sometimes the overlap can be solved with the simple addition of North, South or East, West.)

According to Coun. Jeff Leiper's ward website, changes are being eyed for the following streets:

- * Patricia Avenue, from Pontiac to Premier.
- * Premier Avenue, from Remic to Island Park Drive and from Patricia to Northwestern.

The councillor also reports there should be movement on the planned "depaying" and closure of a portion of Pontiac (at the edge of the park) after the school year ends. Step One would be installing so-called Jersey barriers to block traffic.
