The Civic Hospital Neighbourhood Association and the Hintonburg Community Association have organized a meeting with a guest speaker who will talk about fraud, to be held on Tuesday, June 10, at 7 p.m. at the Hintonburg Community Centre. All welcome.

There have been reports from Pinhey Street residents of thefts from cars and back decks. Make sure to keep your vehicles locked and valuables out of sight.

3. Male sought for human trafficking

The Ottawa Police Service is seeking public assistance in locating Taylor DAGG, a 23-year-old Ottawa man. He is wanted by the Ottawa Police in relation to a Human Trafficking investigation that started in 2013.

DAGG has two outstanding warrants with the Ottawa Police Service:

- 1- A first Instance Warrant for Breach of recognizance (2 counts)
- 2- A Bench Warrant for failing to appear at his preliminary hearing.

DAGG is currently facing the following criminal charges:

- Trafficking in Persons
- Material Benefit resulting from Trafficking in Persons
- Forcible Confinement
- Uttering Threats to cause bodily harm - 2 counts
- Intimidation by threats of violence
- Theft Under \$5000

DAGG measures about 175 cm (5'09") and weighs about 68 kg (150 lb). He is of dark complexion, has a thin/slender build, has short curly black hair, may have a thin

moustache, and has dark eyes.

DAGG is believed to be in the Ottawa-Gatineau area.

Le Service de police d'Ottawa sollicite l'aide de la population afin de localiser Taylor DAGG, un homme d'Ottawa âgé de 23 ans. Il est recherché par la Police d'Ottawa en rapport à une enquête portant sur la traite de personnes et qui fut ouverte en 2013.

DAGG fait l'objet de deux mandats en suspens détenus par le Service de police d'Ottawa:

- 1- Un mandat de première instance pour manquement à un engagement (2 chefs)
- 2- Un mandat d'arrêt décerné sur le siège pour défaut de comparution à son enquête préliminaire.

DAGG doit présentement répondre des accusations criminelles suivantes:

- Traite de personnes
- Tirer un gain financier de la traite de personnes
- Séquestration
- Profération de menaces de causer des lésions corporelles (2 chefs)
- Intimidation par des menaces de violence
- Vol de moins de 5 000\$

DAGG mesure environ 1,75 m (5 pi 9 po) et pèse près de 68 kg (150 lb). Il a le teint foncé, la carrure mince, les cheveux noirs frisés, porte possiblement une mince moustache, et a les yeux foncés.

Les enquêteurs estiment que DAGG se trouverait dans la région d'Ottawa-Gatineau.

OPS and By-Law services base their work on call statistics. The more calls that you make, the more neighbourhood services we receive. There are three steps to making the call:

a) Deciding which number to phone.

If you have an emergency or see a crime in progress, call 9-1-1. If your car was broken into or you need police to attend another non-urgent situation, please call the “other emergencies” number (613-230-6211). To report an incident after it occurred without police attending the scene, please call 613-236-1222 – ext. 7300. You can reach by-law services at 3-1-1.

b) Getting a report number.

When the dispatcher answers, it is a good idea to ask for a report number immediately. We’ve found that dispatchers sometimes hang up before we get to ask for a number or we forget. Asking for a report number right away solves these problems.

c) Share your report number and incident.

Please e-mail your report numbers and a brief description of the incident to your Block Captain (if you have one), or directly to us.

Importance of Reporting Prostitution and Problem Addresses

Neighbourhood Watch members can support the police by writing down and phoning in important information such as: vehicle descriptions and license plate numbers (specify Ontario or Quebec) of anyone soliciting prostitutes, descriptions of drug dealers and addresses of crack houses.
