2. STEP in June

The Gatineau Police Service and Ottawa Police Service's [Selective Traffic Enforcement Program \(STEP\)](#) will focus on impaired driving and construction zones during the month of June.

Impaired Driving:

Between 2009 and 2013, there were 1703 collisions resulting in 726 injuries and 24 fatalities.

Construction Zones

In Ottawa, between 2007 and 2011, 981 collisions occurred in construction zones resulting in 212 injuries, nine of which were serious. Four construction workers were actually struck and injured on the job by a motorist.

The Safer Roads Ottawa Program is a leading community partnership between Ottawa Fire Services, Ottawa Paramedic Service, Ottawa Police Service, Ottawa Public Health and the Public Works Department committed to preventing or eliminating road deaths and serious injuries for all people in the City of Ottawa, through culture change,

community engagement, and development of a sustainable safe transportation environment.

Also participating in the Safer Roads Ottawa Program are the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP), Ontario Provincial Police (OPP), Sureté du Québec, Department of National Defence's Military Police and Gatineau Police Service to improve road safety for all residents of the national capital region.

Ottawa residents have identified traffic safety as a top priority. The [Safer Roads Ottawa Program](#) is committed to using available resources to make Ottawa roads safer for residents.

2. Le PASC au mois de juin

Au cours du mois de juin, le Service de police de Gatineau et le Service de police d'Ottawa, par l'intermédiaire de son [Programme d'application sélective en matière de circulation \(PASC\)](#), cibleront la conduite avec facultés affaiblies et les chantiers de construction.

Conduite avec facultés affaiblies :

Entre 2009 et 2013, 1 703 collisions ont entraîné 726 blessures et 24 décès.

Chantiers de construction

De 2007 à 2011, il y a eu 981 collisions le long de chantiers de construction à Ottawa. Elles ont causé des blessures à 212 personnes, quatre d'entre elles ayant été blessées grièvement. Quatre personnes qui travaillaient sur des chantiers ont été frappées par des automobilistes et blessées.

Le Programme d'amélioration de la sécurité des routes à Ottawa est un important partenariat communautaire liant le Service des incendies d'Ottawa, le Service paramédic d'Ottawa, le Service de police d'Ottawa, Santé publique Ottawa et les Services des travaux publics, et qui s'engage à prévenir et à éliminer des décès et des blessures graves sur la route pour le bien commun à Ottawa, par la voie du changement culturel, de l'engagement communautaire et du développement d'un environnement de transport durable et sûr.

Parmi les participants au Programme d'amélioration de la sécurité des routes à Ottawa, on compte aussi la Gendarmerie royale du Canada (GRC), la Police provinciale de l'Ontario (PPO), la Sûreté du Québec, la Police militaire du ministère de la Défense nationale et le Service de police de Gatineau, visant tous à accroître la sécurité routière pour tous les résidents de la région de la capitale nationale.

Les résidents d'Ottawa ont identifié la sécurité routière parmi leurs grandes priorités. Le [**Programme d'amélioration de la sécurité des routes à Ottawa**](#) s'est engagé à faire appel aux ressources disponibles pour rendre les routes d'Ottawa plus sûres pour ses résidents.

OPS and By-Law services base their work on call statistics. The more calls that you make, the more neighbourhood services we receive. There are three steps to making the call:

a) Deciding which number to phone.

If you have an emergency or see a crime in progress, call 9-1-1. If your car was broken into or you need police to attend another non-urgent situation, please call the "other emergencies" number (613-230-6211). To report an incident after it occurred without

police attending the scene, please call 613-236-1222 – ext. 7300. You can reach by-law services at 3-1-1.

b) Getting a report number.

When the dispatcher answers, it is a good idea to ask for a report number immediately. We've found that dispatchers sometimes hang up before we get to ask for a number or we forget. Asking for a report number right away solves these problems.

c) Share your report number and incident.

Please e-mail your report numbers and a brief description of the incident to your Block Captain (if you have one), or directly to us.

Importance of Reporting Prostitution and Problem Addresses

Neighbourhood Watch members can support the police by writing down and phoning in important information such as: vehicle descriptions and license plate numbers (specify Ontario or Quebec) of anyone soliciting prostitutes, descriptions of drug dealers and addresses of crack houses.

Graffiti

If you spot graffiti, call 3-1-1. Graffiti kits are available from your city councillor.
