1. Theft of Canada Goose winter parkas

The Ottawa Police Service Break and Enter Unit is seeking public assistance to identify suspects involved in commercial break and enters that occurred at "Le Baron Outdoor Store" on Merivale Road and at "NRML" on Richmond Road in November.

Within the past two weeks, there have been three commercial break-ins where 'Canada Goose' brand winter parkas were targeted. In excess of 350 jackets were stolen including all sizes, colors, and styles for men and women.

"If you're purchasing this brand of jacket from a private vendor or on the internet, please be mindful that it could be a stolen item," said Det. Ryan O'Neil of the Break and Enter Unit. "Make sure you know the vendor."

Investigators are looking for two vehicles of interest: one is a white 5-ton truck and the second is a beige/cream coloured hatchback.

2. Annual Ottawa Police Service Awards Ceremony

Tuesday evening, Chief Charles Bordeleau and the Ottawa Police Services Board Chair Eli El-Chantiry will host the annual Ottawa Police Service Awards Ceremony. This Ceremony recognizes the service of members of the Ottawa Police with the presentation of different awards.

There are 150 recipients who will receive one of the awards listed below:

The Police Exemplary Service Medal is presented on behalf of the Governor General of Canada to all sworn members of the Police Service who have completed twenty years of exemplary service with a Canadian Police Service. Police officers who have completed

an additional ten years of exemplary service are entitled to receive a bar, which is worn with the medal.

A Civilian Service gift is presented in recognition of service to civilian employees who have completed 20, 30 and 40 years of full time service. Sworn and civilian members who reach 25 years of service are presented a timepiece of their choice and sworn and civilian members who reach 35 years of service receive a gift.

The Canadian Peacekeeping Service Medal was established to acknowledge the unique contribution to peace that Canadian peacekeepers have made since 1947. We are honouring two members for their overseas missions.

1. Cambriolages des manteaux d'hiver de marque « Canada Goose »

L'Unité des introductions par effraction du Service de police d'Ottawa sollicite l'aide de la population dans le but d'identifier les suspects impliqués dans des cambriolages de commerces perpétrés en novembre au magasin de produits de plein air Le Baron du chemin Merivale et au magasin NRML du chemin Richmond.

Au cours des deux dernières semaines, trois cambriolages furent commis, lors desquels les malfaiteurs ciblaient des manteaux d'hiver de marque « Canada Goose ». Plus de 350 manteaux de toutes tailles, couleurs et styles, pour hommes et femmes furent emportés par les voleurs.

« Si vous achetez un manteau de cette marque d'un vendeur privé ou en ligne, sachez qu'il pourrait s'agir de marchandise volée, » dit le détective Ryan O'Neil, de l'Unité des introductions par effraction. « Assurez-vous de connaître le vendeur. »

Les enquêteurs sont à la recherche de deux véhicules d'intérêt: un camion blanc de 5 tonnes et une berline de couleur beige ou crème.

2. Cérémonie annuelle de remise des prix du Service de Police d'Ottawa

Mardi soir, le chef Charles Bordeleau et le président Eli El-Chantiry de la Commission de services policiers d'Ottawa seront les hôtes de la Cérémonie annuelle de remise des prix

du Service de Police d'Ottawa. Cette cérémonie vise à honorer le service des membres de la Police d'Ottawa en leur remettant un certificat ou un prix.

En tout, 150 prix, tels que décrits plus bas, seront décernés lors de la Cérémonie :

La Médaille de la police pour services distingués est remise de la part du Gouverneur général du Canada à tous les agents du Service de police qui ont complété une période de 20 ans. Les agents ayant complété 30 ans reçoivent une barrette qui est portée avec la médaille.

Un cadeau de service civil est décerné pour services rendus aux employés civils qui ont accumulé 20, 30 ou 40 ans de service à plein temps. Les membres assermentés et civils qui atteignent leurs 25 ans de service se voient offrir la montre de leur choix, et les membres assermentés et civils qui atteignent leurs 35 ans de service reçoivent un cadeau de la part du Service de police d'Ottawa.

La Médaille canadienne du maintien de la paix fut créée pour souligner la contribution particulière qu'apportent les casques bleus canadiens en faveur de la paix depuis 1947. Nous rendons hommage à deux membres pour leurs missions outre-mer.

OPS and By-Law services base their work on call statistics. The more calls that you make, the more neighbourhood services we receive. There are three steps to making the call:

a) Deciding which number to phone.

If you have an emergency or see a crime in progress, call 9-1-1. If your car was broken into or you need police to attend another non-urgent situation, please call the "other emergencies" number (613-230-6211). To report an incident after it occurred without police attending the scene, please call 613-236-1222 – ext. 7300. You can reach by-law services at 3-1-1.

b) Getting a report number.

When the dispatcher answers, it is a good idea to ask for a report number immediately. We've found that dispatchers sometimes hang up before we get to ask for a number or we forget. Asking for a report number right away solves these problems.

c) Share your report number and incident.

Please e-mail your report numbers and a brief description of the incident to your Block Captain (if you have one), or directly to us.

Importance of Reporting Prostitution and Problem Addresses

Neighbourhood Watch members can support the police by writing down and phoning in important information such as: vehicle descriptions and license plate numbers (specify Ontario or Quebec) of anyone soliciting prostitutes, descriptions of drug dealers and addresses of crack houses.
