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1. Missing girl

The Ottawa Police Service is asking for assistance in locating a missing female, Mackenzie Prince, 14 years of Ottawa. Her family is concerned for her well-being.

Mackenzie went missing on Sept 6th, 2016 in the evening, and was last seen in the area of the Russell Road.

Mackenzie is described as dark-skinned, 5'6" tall (168 cm), approx. 155 lbs (70 kg), dark hair with blond highlights. There is no clothing description available for her.

The session is designed to educate potential candidates about the Constable Selection Process. The practice sessions will also give the participants an opportunity to see if they can meet the physical requirements of the job.

The September 24th session will be held between 9:00am to 1:00pm at Algonquin College Woodroffe Campus, P building, 1385 Woodroffe Avenue, in Ottawa.

Gym attire is required. If you are 40 years of age or older, a PARMED X will be required by your doctor.

1. Adolescente portée disparue

Le Service de police d'Ottawa sollicite l'aide de la population afin de retrouver une adolescente portée disparue, Mackenzie Prince, âgée de 14 ans. Sa famille s'inquiète pour son bien-être.

On perdit la trace Mackenzie dans la soirée du mardi 6 septembre 2016. Elle fut aperçue pour la dernière fois dans les environs du chemin Russell.

Mackenzie a été décrite comme mesurant 1,68 m (5 pi 6 po), pesant environ 70 kg (155 lb), le teint foncé, les cheveux foncés avec des mèches blondes. Pour le moment, on ne dispose d'aucun signalement de sa tenue vestimentaire.

Si vous savez où se trouve présentement Mackenzie, vous êtes prié de contacter sans tarder la répartition de la Police d'Ottawa au 613-236-1222. Si vous disposez de renseignements susceptibles d'être utiles aux enquêteurs, communiquez avec l'Unité des personnes portées disparues durant les heures normales d'ouverture, soit du lundi au vendredi entre 8 et 16 heures, au 613-236-1222, poste 2355.

2. Séance d'information et de pratique PREP

Le Service de police d'Ottawa tiendra une séance d'information et de pratique PREP pour hommes et femmes concernant le processus de sélection d'agents de l'ACPO, le samedi le 24 septembre 2016.

La séance du 24 septembre aura lieu de 9 h 00 à 13 h 00 à l'édifice P du campus Woodroffe du Collège Algonquin, situé au 1385, av. Woodroffe à Ottawa.

Une tenue vestimentaire sportive sera obligatoire. Si vous êtes âgé de 40 ans ou plus, un formulaire X-AAP sera exigé par votre médecin.

Afin de participer à la séance, vous devez vous [inscrire d'avance en ligne](#) car le nombre de places disponibles étant limité.

Veuillez noter que vous devrez recevoir un courriel de confirmation avant de vous présenter à la séance.

OPS and By-Law services base their work on call statistics. The more calls that you make, the more neighbourhood services we receive. There are three steps to making the call:

a) Deciding which number to phone.

If you have an emergency or see a crime in progress, call 9-1-1. If your car was broken into or you need police to attend another non-urgent situation, please call the "other emergencies" number (613-230-6211). To report an incident after it occurred without police attending the scene, please call 613-236-1222 – ext. 7300. You can reach by-law services at 3-1-1.

b) Getting a report number.

When the dispatcher answers, it is a good idea to ask for a report number immediately. We've found that dispatchers sometimes hang up before we get to ask for a number or we forget. Asking for a report number right away solves these problems.

c) Share your report number and incident.

Please e-mail your report numbers and a brief description of the incident to your Block Captain (if you have one), or directly to us.

Importance of Reporting Prostitution and Problem Addresses

Neighbourhood Watch members can support the police by writing down and phoning in important information such as: vehicle descriptions and license plate numbers (specify

Ontario or Quebec) of anyone soliciting prostitutes, descriptions of drug dealers and addresses of crack houses.
