Traffic Calming Evaluation: Residents who live along the first block or so of Clearview or who attended the open house sould have received a questionnaire re the traffic calming on a selected road, in this case preferably Clearview (narrowing at Island Park Drive). If you did not receive this questionnaire and you would like to comment on the traffic calming pilot measure on Clearview Avenue please let me know. Your comments about the effect of this device, if any, positive or negative, will help in the evaluation of the pilot projects. Similarly if you wish to comment about the raised intersection and narrowings on Churchill, the changes at the corner of Scott and Island Park Drive or the speed hump on Merivale near Westgate please feel free to drop me a line. You can leave any comments in the mailbox at 118 Clearview, telephone me at 722-6039 or e-mail me at ae694@freenet.carleton.ca. I will ensure they get communicated to the consultants who are doing the evaluation.

Transition team: The two existing federations of citizens' associations; the Federation of Citizens' Associations of Ottawa-Carleton (which in spite of its name includes only Ottawa based Community Associations) and the Federation of Nepean Community Associations have met and set up a team to explore ways in which community associations can work with them together in interaction with the new amalgamated city. They will also be looking at how to include associations from the other

municipalities.

Greenspace Issues: Several of the existing wooded lots in other parts of the city are under threat. Montfort Woods has a rezoning and subdivision application in the works and a lightly wooded property near Sawmill Creek allow uses accessory to uses on abutting property, which may encourage use of the Hydro lands for parking for these abutting lands (beyond that required by the by-law) Given the few wooded areas left in the city the NOSS study identified and prioritized them but funds to follow through and preserve those in private hands are lacking. The City Council has not handled its reserve park funds (largely derived from developers from payments in lieu of parkland) in a fashion which has allowed them to purchase threatened areas. Loblaws: It seems likely this issue will be coming to Planning Committee on Mar. 28.

National Capital Commission's Plans for downtown: The NCC has said they will consult the public on the plans for the downtown, but we have yet to see them announce a public meeting or even an open house where we could see what they are intending to do. While we can look forward to fewer municipal governments in the near future, we will still have the NCC doing what it wishes with little opportunities to have input, whether positive or negative. Until their plans are revealed we are working on rumours. Better consultation with the city, the Sparks Street Mall etc. would probably avoid problems later.

Parking on Northwestern/Pontiac Related to Night-Time Activities in The NCC Woods

Two residents of Northwestern Avenue have been addressing a night-time parking problem in our neighbourhood that worsened last spring when the RCMP decided to start ticketing cars parked at Remic Rapids after 10 PM. Our neighbourhood has now become the alternate parking area related to these "night-time activities in the woods". The "two Thompsons", Neville and Manson (who are, by the way, not related to each other except as neighbours!) have had a variety of discussions with the police, the NCC, the City, the Region and the Community Association regarding possible remedies to this situation. Last fall they convinced the NCC to cut back some of the bushes at the Northwestern Ave. gate to Tunney's Pasture, increasing visibility in the area.

Some other suggestions that have been recently

discussed are as follows:

Install lighting in the Tunney's Pasture Parking Lot nearest to Northwestern to increase visibility; increase police presence and legal enforcement as appropriate; reduce the number of parking spaces on Pontiac adjacent to the NCC property (while leaving some to serve the playing field and ball diamond); post signs that the park is closed at 10 pm with enforcement; explore options to restrict overnight parking in the area; and ensure that regular clean-up of the area is done to address health and safety concerns. Also explored, but rejected, was the option of closing the Northwestern Ave. gate to Tunney's Pasture, as it is used by pedestrians and cyclists to access the offices and buses at the Pasture.
