

AMY'S CORNER

Facilities consultation: A fair sized crowd showed up for the consultation on "legacy" facility projects to discover that the ones of most interest to this central Ottawa group (i.e. Plante Bath and Glebe Community Centre) were already considered as underway. The presenters indicated the general direction which will be taken in prioritizing the projects planned but not underway by the former municipalities. Later there will be consultation on the need for facilities for which the former municipalities had no plans. Obvious duplications will of course be eliminated. (e.g. plans for two arenas within blocks of each other).

Service standards consultation: This consultation includes standards for road maintenance, parks & trees, sports fields, etc. and how culture and recreation programs will be delivered in the future. I have tried unsuccessfully to find the materials available at the open houses (borrowed from Linda Hoad) on the city's web site. A questionnaire distributed at the open house asked how respondents would rate factors such as volume of traffic, public buildings (e.g. schools, churches), etc. in determining how the city should prioritize maintenance activities. If you are concerned about street and sidewalk maintenance (Snow-plowing etc.) call Alain Gauthier of the city at 580-2424 ext. 21197 to express your suggestions concerning maintenance practices or to obtain more information.

With regard to parks, trees and sports fields, the open houses were seeking input on the level of importance of factors such as intensity of use, trees/urban forests to assist in the prioritizing maintenance activities. Again if you are interested call the above number. Culture and recreation: City Council accepted a report " Mandate for Recreation and Culture Programs and Services" in August. The report can be found at http://city.ottawa.on.ca/calendar/ottawa/citycouncil /occ/2001/08-8/hrss/acs2001-peo-com-0007.htm The mandate states the service delivery model will provide a continuum of introductory, intermediate and advanced recreation and culture programs and services. Emphasis in the mandate will be placed on reducing barriers to participation, providing introductory programs for all ages and stages of life, and providing affordable community access to programs and services. The goal is to make recreation and culture programs accessible, affordable and responsive to community

A feedback form available at the open houses asked people to rate the importance of guiding principles and service objectives such as "emphasize access to introductory programs and services in every community", etc. Feedback was also requested on facility allocation policy by rating factors such as "Ensure that community organisations that have historically allocated public facilities will be able to continue to do so, in accordance with the city's Facility Allocation Policy" and "Encourage and accommodate new and emerging initiatives". The open houses were advertised in the Citizen but only two were nearby. If you would like to have input on these topics call or

Westboro Beach developments: On Nov. 22, the Planning Committee approved the zoning amendment for 210 Clearview to allow a ten story apartment tower to be built west of the existing 22-storey tower on the south side of Clearview (200) and the old Hydro rightof-way. The land is owned by the same company which owns the towers. The parking that was provided on this land for the 200 Clearview tower will now be provided on the remnant Hydro land. The Hydro corridor was part of the Greenway System in Ottawa's Official Plan but unfortunately parking is permissible. The site plan has not yet been submitted but several alternatives were shown, one of which contained a pedestrian path which would facilitate access to the transitway. Let us hope the site plan, when submitted, will include that and as much parking underground as feasible to retain the green space.

The apartment tower will add to the 32 town houses now being built east of the 200 Clearview tower for which no zoning amendment was required and for which the site plan was approved. The site plan for the planned 32-storey tower to be built closer to Scott (east of the transformer station) may soon come to Planning Committee if undelegated. A variance was granted to allow the increase from the relatively high height limit in the zoning (20 storeys). West of the transformer station another site plan for more is being examined for town houses. Plans for the area east and north of the 32 storey tower are still to come.
