Peek-a-boo! Don McVeigh has illustrated his first book, bringing to life *The Silver Tree*

A poem, a pen, a picture

Martha Gould's lyrical storybook for children has come to life on the page, thanks to the efforts of an Ottawa artist and resident of Northwestern Avenue, Don McVeigh.

Don's illustrations for *The Silver Tree* are sure to please both a child hearing the story and an adult who might be reading it to them. You can see for yourself by attending a book launch for *The Silver Tree* on **Sunday, Oct. 13 at 2 p.m.** at Collected Works bookstore on Wellington Street.

Although the house on Northwestern where he lives with his wife, Kay Young, and son, Jack, 12, is filled with Don's artistic creations, this is the first time the 51-year-old has illustrated a book.

When Martha asked him if he would illustrate her story, Don agreed to do so

because he thought it would be "fun, and a challenge."

The publisher is Catchfire Press Inc., based in North Bay, Ont. This is where Martha has been living for some time, but it was in Saskatchewan, 20 years ago, that Don and Martha first met.

At the time, Don was working as an artist after completing Bachelor and Masters degrees in Fine Arts.

"Martha wrote the poem in 1985 and sent me a copy," Don recalls. "But nobody seemed interested in publishing it then, so she put it in a bottom drawer."

When a North Bay publisher offered to see the book through to publication two years ago, Martha wanted Don to lend his experience and talent to the task.

The artist's main challenge was to create a "look" for the only human character (*Please turn to next page*)

"I worked on the drawings, off and on, for a couple of months...and when I showed Martha what I had done, she said that would be okay."

A less humble man would use a more descriptive adjective than "okay" to describe his work. If you attend the book launch this Sunday, you will see for yourself just how skillful and beautiful Don's drawings are.

And if you ever have a desire to learn the art of drawing or watercolour painting, sign up for one of Don's beginner classes at the Ottawa School of Art. He has been teaching at the School for the last 13 years.



Input matters in review of city plan

Preliminary Draft Official Plan:

These plans will affect the future shape of the city and this neighbour-

hood. Try to attend one of the sessions if you can. When the plans are made, and there are features you do not like, it may be too late to change, except by amendments, which are hard to obtain.

A democracy needs active citizens to function well and the city is making considerable efforts to provide opportunities for input. The advantage of attending in person, rather than on-line, is the possibility of hearing suggestions you like or of persuading others with your ideas. If you also wish to express your opinion, call me. I will pass it on.

Greenspace network

The preliminary draft Official Plan has a section with this title. A few selected sentences from this section follow: "The pattern followed by increased urban expansion and growth must not result in the wholesale fragmentation of natural systems."

Unfortunately the Greenspace Network is not a formal land-use designation in the Official Plan. The areas which have truly protective land-use designations are: Significant wetland; Natural Environment Area A; Urban Environmental Feature (includes Mud Lake, McCarthy Woods, Rockcliffe Woods and not much else).

These areas allow no lot creation. Natural Environmental Area B and General Rural Area (Natural Feature Area) require an EIS if development is proposed. Our woods are given the Major Open Space designation which the plan states are in, or intended to be in, public ownership and are, or will be, generally available for public use and enjoyment.

"Minor revisions to the boundaries of lands designated Major Open Space are permitted without amendment to this Plan, if based on more detailed studies carried out by the City, other public agencies or as part of development agreements."

This wording is rather worrying given the NCC's interpretation of the Greenway System in the (old) City of Ottawa Official Plan as conceptual and thus more than half an area could be sold off. We could suggest that the portion of our woods with the ES zoning be placed in the Urban Environmental Feature category rather than the Major Open Space group.

Mosque Parking

You will remember City Council passed a resolution authorizing a land swap with Public Works so as to allow the Mosque to purchase land to own and expand their parking. The Mosque subcommittee of our community association was at the table to ensure that reasonable conditions were included to ensure that community interests, with respect to parking, were protected. The word from the city solicitor at the end of August is that negotiations are continuing between Public Works, the city and the Ottawa Muslim Association and that a transaction is likely this fall.

Garbage on NCC property

Resident **Steve Cumbaa** has made the NCC, the city and St. George school aware of a garbage problem bordering the athletic field and along Patricia and Pontiac streets. In a letter to the authorities, Steve has suggested some easy, practical solutions, including lighting and installing garbage cans. The executive will be monitoring this issue to see what sort of response is received.
