As many of you know, there was a motion passed at City Council a few years ago that would result in the City serving as an intermediary between the OMA and Public Works in a purchase of land to be used for mosque parking.

The CPCA had asked that certain

An eclectic mixture of decorating ideas and historic architecture await visitors at this year's Seventh Annual Old Ottawa West House Tour. Here is a snapshot of this year's tour.

The Collectors' Gallery, Civic Hospital neighbourhood.

This home masterfully sets off an international art collection. A signature block motif was used to link all the wonderful elements of this place of beauty: up the stairs, the room dividers, even the glass blocks.

The Tea Room Cottage, West Wellington Village.

Built in 1918, this rare Mission style home became a tea room during the

Depression. It is in almost original condition and features the original wood wainscoting, an extra wide staircase, gorgeous wood pillars, and lovely antiques. Special Feature: Meet Gill Magnan, owner of House Heritage Residential Biographies.

The Mini "Montebello" House, Westboro

Follow the welcoming inukshuk into this landmark log cottage built in the 1940s and recently renovated. Max Finklestein, explorer, raconteur, and author of *Canoeing a Continent: On the trail of Alexander Mackenzie*, will display his canoes used to explore over 20,000 kms of water throughout Canada, Africa and Australia.

Out of Ruins, Highland Park

Diane Proulx uses broken glass and old frames to create works of art inspired by her love of gardening. Her art is on display everywhere: in the garden, the basement studio where she gives classes, and in the custom designed kitchen.

St. Basil's Catholic Community, McKellar Heights

In 1960, the first round church in Ottawa may have seemed and felt radical, but in fact it is deeply traditional and functional. It features the paintings of renowned Canadian artist, Gerald Trottier. He also designed the baptismal font, the crucifix, and the corpus built by the distinguished sculptor and metallurgist W. Schwazkoglar.



conditions be attached to the deed to ensure the land was used solely for mosque parishioner parking, and not for commercial parking or building purposes. These conditions were later contested by a subsequent executive of the OMA, and the transaction has been stalled.

The purpose of the recent meeting was for the mayor's office to determine the current interests of the CPCA and the OMA, and to try to move the trans action forward. The results:

The OMA does not wish to build on the land in the near future, so they are willing to retain the "no-building for 20 years" condition.

The OMA does not currently wish to rent parking commercially on Friday, their day of worship, and they are willing to have a new "no commercial parking on Fridays" condition.

The OMA does wish to continue commercial parking Monday to Thursday, as they rely heavily on the revenue. They also point out that the church next door uses commercial parking to supplement its revenue. It should be noted, however, that there is a significant difference in the numbers parked at the church (about 30) and those that will be parking at the mosque (about 170).

in the currently leased lot, according to a 1998 car count).

The CPCA does not wish to have cars destined for the mosque's commercial parking venture travel through the neighbourhood. Both parties agreed one way to address this is to request that Public Works allow an entrance to the commercial part of the lot through Tunney's Pasture (Ross Avenue.) This has been requested before, but Public Works has refused. It was agreed by all parties that the time may be right to launch a new lobby effort to build an entrance from Ross into the mosque lot. If that entrance were to be approved, and a barrier erected to ensure that commercial parkers would enter the lot only from Ross, and not from Northwestern, the CPCA would be willing to waive the no-commercial parking condition.

In summary, since the "no building for 20 years" condition is acceptable to both parties, the commercial parking condition is the only source of disagreement. If a Ross Avenue entrance to the mosque parking lot could be achieved (with barriers blocking access to the commercial part of the lot from the neighbourhood) and a new "no commercial parking on Fridays" condition is added, the CPCA and the OMA could resolve the current impasse.
