

Almost \$8,000 was taken from the school safe, in what can only be described as a truly sad, and despicable act. It left the school council with a \$10,000 bill with the chocolate bar manufacturer, and the cold hard slap of reality for some very young and innocent children.

From the comprehensive media coverage, to the public response, from the numerous phone calls expressing support, kind words, and condolences as well as outrage and disgust, to what has been the most reassuring of reactions from people with no direct link to our school, or local community. For example, one individual had already written a certified cheque to cover the entire amount stolen before he even called, and then dropped it off.

There are the other school councils from both the public and Catholic systems who pledged funds, and offered to challenge other schools to match their support. There was the Trent University Student Union who heard of our plight and pledged funds.

Or, another fundraising organization that donated coupon books so that we could replace our lost funds. The countless individuals who sold additional chocolate bars on our behalf. To all of you who cared enough to help us in our hour of need, thank

you very much.

However, we seem to have been covered by insurance so your generosity of spirit is accepted and truly appreciated, but your gifts are not required.

So, this has been one of life's lessons learned for our children and our whole school community. We learned that our innocence and naïveté could be stolen as easily as our possessions. That nothing is safe, or sacred, from those willing to trample the values we hold dear and hope to instill in our children. But more importantly, we learned that, despite the incursion of an increasingly harsh and ruthless world, there is in our community a foundation of decency and respect that is bigger and stronger than any petty criminal. We would again like to say thank you and God Bless to everyone who called and offered their support, and who bought our children's chocolate bars.

3 lanes, bike route planned for Scott

Oct. 23 saw another open house on Scott Street, this time for the section from Ross Avenue to Holland.

This open house was essentially a repeat of the earlier one with the same recommendation for a three-lane cross-section, with the centre lane used for left turns.

However, this open house also included a sheet showing comments and answers from the earlier open house. A summary of two key concerns:

Capacity of Scott Street

There was a worry that reducing the number of through lanes on Scott would reduce roadway capacity and increase traffic delays. New developments are only going to add to volume. Scott should be widened, not reduced.

City Response: The transportation analysis shows the capacity of Scott will not change considerably under the proposed configuration. Research has shown the capacity of a three-lane roadway is very near that of a four-lane undivided roadway, due to inefficiencies of four-lane roads resulting from combining through traffic and turning traffic in the middle two lanes. Travel times are not expected to increase substantially.

Analysis further showed the capacity of Scott will be sufficient to meet the demands, even accounting for further development in the area.

Cycling lanes

All responses supported the provision of cycling facilities within the Scott corridor. Many felt that it would be

more appropriate to provide the facilities in the boulevard on the north side of the road.

City Response: The City of Ottawa has identified Scott as a key utilitarian cycling corridor. Utilitarian cycling is best served by on-road facilities (off-road cycling facilities tend to serve more of a

recreational purpose). The City of Ottawa's Cycling Advisory Committee supports the provision of on-road cycling lanes on Scott.
