Mosque parking meeting March 10

The Community Association has called a meeting for **March 10** to discuss the rezoning application for commercial parking at the Central Mosque on Northwestern Avenue.

We have already stated our opposition in writing. The meeting is to discuss the presentation to a city of Ottawa committee that is scheduled for April.

If you can't attend, but would like

to attend the city hall hearing to express your views, you can call Jonathan, Lynne or Amy (phone numbers on page 2). The meeting begins at **7:30 p.m.** in the fieldhouse.

As many of you know, there is some history that explains why the association would oppose the rezoning.

In 2004, the Ottawa Muslim Association (OMA) was able to pur-

chase their existing parking lot (formerly leased from the federal department of Public Works) plus some adjacent land.

This step was supported by the community association.

The mosque has now applied to have the land rezoned from "government" to "place of worship" use, as required by the City.

Unleashed, out of control: Bad dogs in our woods?

OGS IN THE HOOD.

It was good to read the above section in last month's *Champlain Speaker*.

Amongst other things, it helps to identify good dogs from bad dogs.

I customarily enjoy a daily walk through the woods in our area north of Pontiac and south of the Parkway. But today was the third time in the past four weeks that I have been seriously concerned for my safety when threatened by an aggressive dog.

On all three occasions during my walks, I have been obliged to stand still to minimize what was to me an unambiguous threat of being bitten. The dogs were large, unleashed, unmuzzled, and not in the immediate control of their quardians.

I do not have a general dislike of dogs, and have sufficient experience of

them to recognize both friendly and aggressive canine behavior when I see it. The offending dogs were three different animals, and in each case I suggested to the guardian that, were the dog to be muzzled, I would be much happier.

Consider.

There is the stress that I and many people experience during such incidents.

They have also applied to use the land for commercial parking.

However, as a condition of purchase, the OMA agreed to accept a legal covenant prohibiting commercial parking on the land, which now will be able to hold about 300 cars.

Purchase of the land was intended to:

Help alleviate mosque-associated parking and traffic problems for the

surrounding community;

Relieve the OMA of the high leasing fees it was paying to the federal government:

Provide much-needed additional parking for Mosque visitors.

The request to allow commercial parking is contrary to the original resolution (a "win-win" solution arrived at by both communities with assistance from Coun. Shawn Little) passed by City Council in 2000.

Consequently, the community association opposes it.

AGE: 10 years old, slowing down a little, a bit of grey around her eyes, but the new kitten in the house keeps her moving.


TRICKS: The usual. Sit, lie down, but also "lick a hand" on command.

City Budget:

By the time you read this, the budget debate will be over and the decisions will be made.

We will have to face increased charges for water and taxes increased by roughly four per cent.

While an efficient city administration is desired by everyone, there are differences as to what the city should support in its budget.

Myself, I keep in mind that if there are too many gaps in the things supported by the city, some area of our quality of life may suffer: either in more homeless on the street, icy streets, a city with fewer trees and worse air, a city with less cultural attractions and thus less attrac-



tive to visitors and residents, etcetera.

Personally, I believe our councillors have very difficult decisions to make and I do not envy them the problem.

Giving a presentation where I was mainly asking that greenspace items in the budget be retained and not cut, I heard some of the requests for additional funds and they all seemed worthy.

One case was an example of where the liability problem had created a situation which might have been handled some years ago by other means: apparently the Highway Traffic Act requires that adult crossing guards be employees.

So if more are needed the city needs to supply the money to the organization that hires and trains them. Volunteers cannot be used.

Just for your information, there were several items in the capital budget of interest to this community: replacement of playground equipment and of the school-age play structure in the park.

Also included were minor repairs and upgrading of the changerooms area of the structures at Westboro Beach.

We are also due for water pipes work on Premier; resurfacing of the Parkway where it is used by the Transitway (between Dominion and Lincoln Fields) and more work on Richmond Road (between Kirkwood and Western).

For Scott Street, we have sewer work (between Ross and Holland) and resurfacing (between Winona and Lanark).

(P.S. Assuming none of these projects is cut from the budget.)

Then again, the merest nip which draws blood requires at least the need to determine quickly that there is documentary evidence the dog has had a valid rabies injection.

Then perhaps I would myself have to undergo an extended and often painful inoculation process.

My mind also boggles at the thought that I might meet an unmuzzled and aggressive dog while walking

through the woods with my young grandchildren.

I understand that dogs like to run free in the open, but I believe that it should not be at my or other people's peril. The suggestion of a good, stout, muzzle is a minimum for animals with the capability of causing serious injury.

My preference is that dogs taken for a walk should be both muzzled and on an adequate restraining leash, especially where pathways are quite narrow.

I do not believe that a dog is to be allowed even one unprovoked bite.

Muzzles and leashes would be an ultimate kindness to the animals themselves.

I have laid no complaints or had any discussions with city authorities, wishing rather to bring the situation to the attention of Champlain Park residents.

It would be encouraging to have some responses to this note in next month's **Speaker**.
