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Soccer field to replace ball diamond at Champlain Park

The Ottawa Internationals Soccer Club has come to the City with a proposal to convert the ball diamond at Champlain Park to a soccer field. The idea of converting under-used ball diamonds to mini soccer fields is part of the City's Sportsfield Strategy (2004). The City asked the Champlain Park Community Association for its opinion, and we obtained details, as provided below. Overall, it seems that this will be a benefit to the community. The conversion to a soccer field will begin in the spring of 2008. The sand/clay/soil mix that makes up the current ball diamond will be removed and replaced with topsoil and sod.

* The soccer program will operate at the field May 15 to August 31 on Mondays and Thursdays from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

* Traffic will not increase above the highest level seen on Monday and Wednesday nights last year

City's Operating Budget: As far as I know, the final budget does not include dropping of services such as our fieldhouse and wading pool. The rink grants will also continue. Taxes will rise by 4.9 percent.

Closing of our local Canadian Tire store:

Unfortunately, the new big box Canadian Tire store on Carling Ave. has resulted in the closing of our local store just west of Island Park Drive on Richmond Road. The store closed on January 9. Many of us will probably miss this store as it was so handy.

Review of City's Official Plan: The City is using somewhat different consultation techniques in connection with this review. To that end, it has produced the following white papers: Addressing Ottawa's Transportation Challenges; The Balance of Jobs and Housing in Orléans; Climate Change and the Official Plan Review; Residential Intensification: Building More Vibrant Communities; Supporting Growth in Ottawa: Water and Sewer Challenges; Development in the Greater Ottawa-Gatineau Area; Compensation Options for Wetlands and Other Environmental Lands; Moving Forward with Rapid Transit; and Ottawa's Natural Environment System: How Well is it Working?

Papers have also been produced by residents on rural topics as follows: Development Outside of Villages; Village Development; Groundwater Resources – Their Wise Use and Protection; and a paper on Process.

The City held a rural forum and a Cite Café in conjunction with these papers. The website has the report from the rural Forum (http://ottawa.ca/ residents/public_consult/rural_settlement/) and from the councillors' discussion of the white paper (https:// ottawa.ca/residents/public_consult/beyond_2020/ special_session/) The City Café report should be available soon. You can still send comments on the white papers to the Planning Department if you are interested.

Comments on the rural documents can be sent to RRS_SRP@ottawa.ca The rural papers are worth your attention because if country lot estates continue to proliferate in the rural area, we will suffer more commuter traffic, and there will be pressure for rural road improvements.

Other City News: Corporate Services Committee will discuss the following on January 15: Our Interim Tax payment due on March 20, 2008 is to be set at 50% of the 2007 Adjusted Annualized Taxation. At last week's Planning and Environment Committee meeting, a report on vacant residential land stated that Ottawa has a supply sufficient for 23 years. This suggests the urban boundary need not be changed.

Accessibility: With reduced mobility due to an infection in my knee. I am again aware of the problems of accessibility. A visit to the General Campus of The Ottawa Hospital illustrates the problem. We got there to find the garage full. (Note: the garage has insufficient disabled spots for the demand.) We were directed to another parking lot with no sign of disabled parking spaces and then had to negotiate a route which involved at least one spot where one needs one to get up from one's wheelchair and lift it over a small difference in height. As the population ages, the need for disabled spots will increase. Some institutions have recognized this, as I know that the number of such spaces at the National Arts Centre has increased over the years. Other institutions seem not to take account of this change. Even some commercial enterprises are neglecting the need for buttons to open doors or the need for ramps if they have stairs.

UPDATE ON PARKING COMMITTEE

Charles Patrick, who is head of a parking committee within the Community Association, reports that his committee is discussing a number of proposals with Councillor Leadman and staff of the City.

In the coming months, a survey that sets out parking options for certain streets will be circulated in Champlain Park. Get ready to let the committee know what you prefer.
