14th Annual Sleigh Ride on December 21



Tips on home security

If your home has a patio door, it is important to be aware of the weaknesses in these doors and how to remedy them. Patio doors most often come with a fixed outer panel and a sliding inner door. In some, the sliding door is on the outside, but similar remedies apply. Burglars seldom attempt to break the glass and will usually attempt to attack the door itself or to break the lock.


First, the locks on these doors will never win any awards for security. They must be supplemented to protect the door against being forced open. Do this by fitting a stick or dowel (piece of hockey stick or broom handle) snugly into the bottom track. Also available is a safety bar called a "charlie bar" that is screwed to the jamb opposite the sliding door. It is placed about a third of the way up the door and is visible from the outside. If the door is vinyl, three- or four-inch screws will have to be used to penetrate the wood framing behind the vinyl sash.

Second, many of these doors have a gap or space at the top that allows the door to be lifted out of its bottom track. (Some can be adjusted so that there is no gap.) To counter this, eliminate the gap. There are two ways to do this: 1) Install a "jimmy plate", i.e., a horizontal piece of wood or metal that is screwed into


the top track. 2) Screw two or three long pan-head screws into the top track in pre-drilled holes at 10-inch intervals and allow them to protrude enough that the door cannot be lifted out (while still sliding freely). Together, these techniques will make the door much more secure.

Finally, an auxiliary lock can be installed, such as a sturdy slide bolt mounted on the inside edge of the door to penetrate the fixed panel frame, the floor, or the top track. If the door is on an outside track, this slide bolt can be attached to the floor or fixed panel to penetrate the sliding door. As well, or as an alternative, pin the mid-section in the bottom corner by drilling a downward angled hole through the sash of the inner panel and part way into the sash of the outer panel. Then place a removable nail into the hole to act as a lock, as can be done on most double-hung or sliding windows.




Self-storing "Charlie bar" to brace sliding patio door.

Amy's Corner

Richmond Road/Westboro Community Design Plan (CDP): This plan has finally been approved as a secondary plan to the Official Plan (OP). For our community, some of the interest about this plan lies in the designations of the following greenspaces:

- 1) Rochester Field which extends from the Ottawa River Parkway to Richmond Road just west of Maplelawn (The Keg restaurant) and
- 2) the Atlantis-Selby lands in the area of those streets in our neighbouring community of Westboro Beach. While Rochester Field is still the subject of an OMB appeal, there was no appeal of the designation of the Atlantis-Selby lands in the OP. However, the National Capital Commission (NCC) expressed reservations about them being categorized as greenspaces in this secondary plan. I am quoting the NCC's position below from the City's website:

"Please note that we have reviewed this from a Capital Planning perspective and support numerous principles outlined in this OPA; including design concepts related to improved linkages to recreation pathways, improving streetscape amenities, implementing provisions to increase the landscaped areas and sidewalk widths along main street corridors and retaining parkland (cash-in-lieu) fees in this community. As noted in previous circulations of the CDP, we also continue to have concerns with respect to the greenspace designations and illustrations of passive open spaces to be confirmed via this CDP on federally owned lands. We do acknowledge some of the revisions in the text to note that the Rochester Field site remains subject of an active appeal to the OMB and therefore any designation and future land use(s) for this site are, at this time, unconfirmed. We continue to take the position this CDP does not

appropriately reflect the NCC's position for federal lands in the study area...

"The NCC is preparing the Capital Urban Lands Master Plan for federal land holdings within the urban area. This federal level master plan is comprised of evaluation, analysis, and public consultation phases and will ultimately develop policy and identify appropriate land use for federal lands. Some sectors identified in the CDP are also the subject of this master plan. We reiterate to the City that the NCC has the legislated authority for the planning of federally owned lands within the Ottawa River Parkway corridor lands. The Capital Urban Lands Master Plan will examine the Ottawa River Parkway corridor in some detail, with provisions for full public consultation and we look forward to integrating to the greatest degree possible the requirements for federal lands with the evolving maturation and diversification of the Richmond Road community."

The designation of these lands as greenspaces was retained in spite of these reservations by the NCC. If you are interested in other aspects of this Community Design Plan (CDP) check out the November 14 Agenda of the Planning and Environment Committee. It is available on the City's website.

City Budget: This year I did not attend any of the budget sessions. I am rather tired of the farce that is the City budget process. Every time the City needs to save money, what gets put forward? Arts and social programs/outdoor rinks and increases in user fees, etc. The police budget gets a relatively free ride because the City does not have direct control over that budget. It is not easy to find the exact sums the City spends on various items and there is no readily available bar or pie chart of City expenditures in its operating budget by type or area of expenditure. The information is there but not in what is supposed to be information for the public (the Draft Budget Booklet-Budget at a Glance), which talks about pressures for increases and solutions but does not give an actual breakdown of where the money is to be spent. There is a report that outlines where \$1,000 of your taxes was spent in 2007. It shows that public safety was the biggest item, at \$205 of the \$1,000. Transit was also very large at \$146. On the other hand, in the Capital budget there is somewhat more than \$113 million for roads. Details are available on the City's website, www.ottawa.ca, for those who wish further information
