1. 2019 Thomas G. Flanagan S.C. Scholarship Award

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In recognition of *Persons Day* on October 18, the Ottawa Police Service (OPS) is pleased to announce that it is now accepting applications for the 2019 Thomas G. Flanagan S.C. Scholarship Award.

The \$1,500 scholarship was established in 1993 in honour of the late Thomas G. Flanagan, who served as chief of police of the OPS between 1989 and 1993. It is presented annually to a woman from a racialized or indigenous community who is interested in pursuing a career in policing, following a period of post-secondary study.

“I am grateful for the financial assistance towards my aspirations to become a police officer,” said Nesreen Hammoud, the 2018 recipient of the Scholarship Award.

Persons Day marks the day women were formally identified as “persons” under the law by the British Privy Council in 1929. Under that new law, women were given the right to be appointed to the Senate, which paved the way for women to campaign for other public office seats.

La bourse d'études Thomas G. Flanagan, É.C. fut instituée en 1993 en l'honneur de feu Thomas G. Flanagan, qui servit en qualité de chef du Service de police d'Ottawa de 1989 à 1993. La bourse est décernée annuellement à une femme d'une communauté racialisée ou autochtone et intéressée à poursuivre, après ses études postsecondaires, une carrière policière au sein du Service de police d'Ottawa.

La Journée de la personne souligne le jour en 1929 où le Conseil privé britannique déclara officiellement que les femmes étaient bel et bien des personnes. En vertu de cette nouvelle loi, les femmes obtenaient le droit d'être nommées au Sénat, ce qui fraya la voie pour les femmes souhaitant briguer les suffrages pour des postes de la fonction publique.
