

Designer guys set eyes on Richmond Road, Westboro Beach

It seems quite some time ago that I attended the open house for this Community Design Plan on April 3rd.

The alternatives shown there of probably the most interest for our community are those for Section 6 (Richmond Road from Island Park Drive to McRae Street and McRae itself, the future Westboro Transit Station area, including Scott Street to Lanark Avenue and the Atlantis/Selby lands bordering the Ottawa River Parkway).

Proposed for the portion of Richmond from McRae to Island Park is an extension of the traditional main street character with mixed-use zoning. Fairly substantial buildings of six storeys or more are shown at the corner with Island Park and replacing the Canadian Tire gasbar and store.

As I recall, no comments were made about this specific area. However, already-expressed concerns about shadowing of houses down slope and north of any tall buildings on Richmond would also apply here.

McRae Street was envisioned as a mixed-use environment linking Richmond's main-street look with the transitway station. The transitway station area was seen as experiencing considerable transit-oriented redevelopment, with higher residential densities and a height

limit of up to 12 storeys (i.e. on the CBC lands); Scott Street was seen as having six to eight storeys of mixed-use, including employment areas, between Churchill and Lanark.

Finally, two alternatives were shown for the Atlantis/Selby lands (NCC owned). As follows:

1) all greenspace with possible amenities intended as the gateway to Westboro Beach. (An option favoured by most).

2) development along Churchill and Royal, with the rest as greenspace.

Currently there is some unhappiness with the proposed variance being requested by the proponent of rezoning at 93 Richmond Road, to avoid the delay caused by the freeze on rezoning until the Community Design Plan is finished.

The rezoning was for a seven-storey seniors building or condos and the variance in question seems to provide for this using the minor variance procedure, which is not covered by the freeze.

Getting elected: the inside story

I attended a conference in Guelph recently with three excellent speakers, James Howard Kunstler, Patrick Condon and Glen Murray.

Kunstler's message was to *Wake Up!*, the cheap energy economy is at its end. Condon's speech told the story of the Headwaters Sustainable Community in Surrey, B.C. and Glen Murray, the former mayor of Winnipeg, described some of his experiences as a municipal politician in trying to achieve a better city.

He said to get elected you needed to run on the three Ps: pavement, pipes and policy; and then to keep taxes down.

He emphasized the importance of cultural institutions, such as libraries, in keeping downtowns lively. As neighbourhood anchors, they may stimulate other building that, over time, will pay back the public investment through increased assessment.

Life's a beach, starting June 18

The Ottawa Public Health
Department samples beach water in the
Ottawa River regularly from June to the
end of August.

The water is tested for E. coli bacteria. When high levels of E. coli are detected in beach water, other disease-causing organisms are likely to be present and may pose a risk to your health.

A no-swimming advisory will be issued if bacteria levels are over 200 E. coli per 100 ml of water tested or if they are over 100 E. coli per 100 ml of water tested on two or more consecutive days.

A 24-hour no swimming advisory will be issued for Westboro Beach after a rainfall of 5 mm or more.

The beaches are officially open from Saturday, June 18 to Sunday, Aug. 28. Lifeguards are on duty weekday hours Monday to Friday from noon to 7 p.m. and weekend hours Saturday, Sunday and statutory holidays from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m.
